Chapter 1 Lesson 4: Promoting Health and Wellness

- 1. How does *Healthy People 2010* define health literacy?
- 2. Give three examples of tasks patients need to be able to carry out.
- 3. About how many Americans have difficulty understanding and using health information?
- 4. Identify four factors that can affect people's level of health literacy.
- 5. Explain three ways in which low health literacy can contribute to a higher rate of death from cancer.
- 6. What is the estimated cost to society of additional health care costs due to low health literacy?

Answers:

- 1. The degree to which individuals have the capacity to obtain, process, and understand basic health information and services needed to make appropriate health decisions
- 2. Any three of the following:
 - Understanding instructions on prescription drug bottles, appointment slips, medical education brochures, doctor's directions and consent forms
 - Negotiating complex health care systems
 - Evaluating information for credibility and quality
 - Analyzing relative risks and benefits
 - Calculating dosages
 - Interpreting test results
 - Locating health information
 - Articulating their health concerns and describing their symptoms accurately
 - Asking pertinent questions of physicians

- Understanding spoken medical advice or treatment directions
- 3. Ninety million people, or nearly half the population
- 4. Lack of educational opportunity, learning disabilities, age-related cognitive declines, and declining reading abilities beyond the last year of school completed
- 5. All of the following:
 - Patients may be diagnosed with cancer at a later state because they do not understand cancer screening information.
 - Patients with cancer may not receive the best treatments for their needs because they do not understand their treatment options.
 - Patients may not make the best choices about which treatments to have because they do not understand informed consent documents.
- 6. About \$73 billion
